





Event Reports

Event 1: Scholars Program Orientation Spring 2024







The Spring 2024 orientation for the BA in English Scholars Program was held on January 13, 2024. The program's mission of academic excellence was shared with the existing and new

students in the program. Students in the Scholars Program are high achievers who seek knowledge through various educational opportunities. The event marked the start of a collective journey, uniting students in their pursuit of success.

Dr. Md. Mahadhi Hasan, the Scholars Program Advisor and Assistant Professor at DEH, spearheaded the orientation, acquainting newly selected students with the intricacies of the program. Emphasizing the ethos of high achievement, Dr. Hasan urged the students of the Scholars Program to embrace opportunities positively for personal development. The orientation also introduced committee members Sheikh Nahiyan and Al Mahmud Rumman, both faculty members at DEH.

Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head of DEH, appreciated the students' enthusiasm to take on challenging projects to improve their academic competencies. She noted that students' participation in this program would prepare them for the job market or higher studies. Event 2: Spring 2024 Orientation









With high spirits and zeal, ULAB's Department of English and Humanities conducted its Orientation Program to welcome the incoming batches of BA and MA students in Spring 2024 on January 18, 2024. The theme of the event was "Spring to Excellence" and the Orientation Speaker was DEH alumna, Ms. Shamael

Mortuza, an Ontario Certified English Language Teacher with an International Certificate in Teaching English as an Additional Language, currently working as an ESL/EAP instructor for adult learners in the Greater Toronto Area in Canada. Ms. Mortuza has a Masters in English Literature from Queen's University in Kingston, a Masters in English Literature and Cultural Studies from ULAB and a Bachelors in English Literature and Language from ULAB.





The program began with a welcome speech by Ms. Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head and Associate Professor of the Department. She provided the students with some words of advice in utilizing their time at university wisely, and to grow into a person to be proud of. The faculty members then introduced themselves after which Ms. Rahman introduced the students to the other key personnel of the department: the admin officer, the

TAs, and the Supervisor to the English Zone. She ended her speech by expressing her thanks

to the teaching assistants, volunteers, performers, and organizing batches of the event for their support in the program.

Professor Kaiser Haq, the Dean of the School of Arts and Humanities, was invited on stage to address the new faces of the department. He brought to attention



the diversity amongst the respected faculty members of DEH, and how the learnings acquired in university always bear real-life applicability.



Then Professor Shamsad Mortuza, Special Advisor to the ULAB Board of Trustees, in his speech, described ULAB as a place for growth and evolution, where the faculty members are diverse yet share a strong bond. He emphasized the beliefs of the university, which include well-rounded knowledge gathered from numerous initiatives that can then be implemented in other aspects of one's journey.

The Orientation Speaker, Ms. Shamael Mortuza, an alumna of the department, then addressed the freshers. Along with being an English Language Instructor in the Greater Toronto Area, Ms. Mortuza is a fiction writer whose works have been included in journals and magazines such as *Kitaab*, *Borderless*, *The Daily Star*, and *World Poetry Today*. Furthermore, she is



also the author of the poetry collection *One Minute Past Midnight*. Ms. Mortuza began her speech by mentioning how she had grown up on different continents but then moved to Bangladesh where her affinity towards literature and linguistics prompted her to apply to ULAB. Through the motivation and inspiration she received from the faculty members, she was able to achieve numerous accolades, such as being on the Dean's Honors List, Vice Chancellor's Honors List, Valedictorian at ULAB's 2021 Convocation, and a gold medal for her MA grades. She acknowledged that, although she chose the traditional route of becoming an educator, students should not narrow their perspectives on what can be achieved through studying English. Detailing her work in Canada with international students and in language centers and programs such as LINC, Ms. Mortuza advised ESL and EFL students never to hesitate to make their voices heard in a classroom. Additionally, she describes university as a place to unlearn certain preconditioned prejudices or biases and focus on bettering oneself as a person. She ended her inspiring speech by wishing the best to all the new students and hoping that ULAB would aid in their pursuit of becoming a better person. A token of appreciation was then handed to her by Professor Kaiser Haq.

Ms. Sirajum Munira Joti, Supervisor of the English Zone, was welcomed on stage where she explained the concept and functionality of the English Zone. This is where students are assisted with their writing and speaking skills by the peer tutoring service. The Zone also conducts various free workshops, guides, and aids that the students were advised to take advantage of.



During the cultural segment, Jannatul Tasnia, a student of Batch 232, graced the stage with a wonderful song performance. This was followed by a captivating dance number by Prity Chanda and Anika Anowar of Batch 233. Rohan Sheikh, a student of Batch 223, then took the stage to perform a lively medley of timeless songs. Following this, Kashfia Israt, from MA Batch 241, was

called up

on stage to speak on behalf of the new graduate students. She shared her admiration for the faculty members of the department and her gratitude to be able to learn from them. She described DEH as a platform that allows students to impart on adventures that contribute to the flourishment of their best selves. Abdullah Jubair, from Batch 241, represented the incoming undergraduate students, conveying his thoughts on the beauty

Event 3: Graduate Student Seminar Spring 2024







The Department of English and Humanities, ULAB, conducted its Graduate Student Seminar of Spring 2024 on February 5, 2024. With faculty members and students in attendance, ten MA in English students, selected by their respective course instructors from the preceding semester, showcased their remarkable papers. The participants presenting their papers represented the three MA tracks: Literature and Cultural Studies, Applied Linguistics and TESOL, and Literature and Creative Writing.

The seminar was inaugurated by Ms. Nadia Rahman, Assistant Professor, DEH, with a warm welcome to the presenters, faculty members, and students. Afterward, she introduced the first participant, Sadia Mukarrama (Batch 232), who presented her paper, "Reconstruction of Shakespeare: From Texts to Screen." In her presentation, Sadia focused on two South Asian adaptations of Shakespeare's plays,



namely *Haider* (an Indian adaptation of *Hamlet*) and *Mandaar* (an Indian-Bengali adaptation of *Macbeth*) while challenging traditional interpretations of his works and the plays' relevance in contemporary society.



Kaniz Fatema Lamia (Batch 231) was the second presenter and her paper was titled, "Language Situation and Scope of Incorporating Translanguaging Pedagogies in HSC-Level English Classrooms of Bangladeshi Alia Madrassas." Lamia discussed the impact and challenges of implementing translanguaging pedagogies in Bangladeshi Madrassa classrooms, while also sharing her observational

findings from conducting this research.

The third presenter was Kashfia Nahreen (Batch 233), whose paper title was "The Essence of Poetry: An Exploration of the Connection between Art and Identity in Tagore's Essay on 'Poet Yeats' and Hughes's Essay 'The Negro Artist and Racial Mountain'." Kashfia embodied

the importance of integrating one's cultural identity into one's works and leaving behind the colonial mentality surrounding the English language through the ideas represented in the essays mentioned in her presentation title.

Next, Quazi Farhina Hassan (Batch 233), presented her paper titled, "Ekphrasis: The Interpretation of Paintings through Modern Poetry," where she highlighted a selection of poems inspired by notable paintings, and how their reception varied from person to person. To further reiterate and elaborate on her point, she brought in survey statistics which gave



insight into the variety while providing occasional comic relief.

Farzana Mir's (Batch 232) paper, "Pre-tertiary Education's Medium of Instruction Policies of Bangladesh and India: A Comparative Analysis," delved into the linguistic ecology of Bangladesh and India for pre-tertiary education, and suggested potential areas of reform in the education structure via a curriculum and

pedagogical change while showing how far the system has come in as recently as 2020.

Next, "How We Learned and Acquired Language" by Mahjabeen Hassan (Batch 233) exhibited the numerous ways we acquire and learn language through the lens of Noam Chomsky's theories of language acquisition. Her two examples mentioned the theories of Interactionism and Behaviourism, with the addition of personal examples to further illustrate her points.

The seventh presenter, Farhin Younus (Batch 232), also related her topic, "Theories through Bare Eyes" on a personal level, and gave examples from her life where she was made to feel like the subject of the theories and ideas she learned about in class. The aforementioned theories drew ideas from the essays, "The Spectacle of the 'Other'" by Stuart Hall and *Black Skin White Masks* by Frantz Fanon.



Afterwards, Nazmun Nahar (Batch 232) presented her paper, "What Makes a Good Teacher: Insights from the 'Teaching Practicum and Classroom Management' Course and My Perspective," where she highlighted three specific dimensions she believes make the most impact on a teacher - the personal, professional and social aspects. Holding the course from which she was nominated as the sample for this study, she explores how a teacher can better themselves to further encourage and empower their students.

Reya Saha (Batch 232), the ninth presenter, chose "Evaluating the Effectiveness of Assessment Methods in English For Today (IX-X) Book" for her topic, and conducted her

research in a qualitative method for the four language skills - listening, reading, speaking and writing. Her study concluded that the textbook emphasized on developing reading and writing skills, and occasionally, speaking skills, but lacked sufficient materials for students to develop their listening skills.

For the concluding presentation, Ahmed Hossain Sanjid (Batch 223) recited three poems titled, "City Dwellers," "Looming Storm," and "If So" from his collection of poems titled, "Light of the Soul". It was especially interesting as this had been the first time Hossain dabbled in poetry, both writing and reciting.



Hearing the presentations, Professor Shamsad Mortuza, Special Advisor, ULAB Board of Trustees, shared his insights on the essence of the Graduate Student Seminar, and how it is a signature program by DEH to showcase and share the hard work students put into their academic endeavors.

Ms. Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head and Associate Professor, DEH, and Professor Kaiser Haq, Dean, School of Arts and Humanities, DEH, were then cordially invited for the certificate-giving session, where they handed over the much-deserved certificates to the participants. With that, the Graduate Student Seminar of Spring 2024 was brought to a successful closure.

































Dr. Hasan introduced the "BAMFI" method that the students had to apply in writing the abstract section of a research paper. He also explained the importance of having a good abstract.

Mr. Al Mahmud Rumman, Senior Lecturer, DEH, and Mr. Sheikh Nahiyan, Lecturer, DEH, were present at the workshop. The session ended with a brief question and answer session with the

Event 6: Workshop and Seminar by Dr. Richard Smith and Dr. Maria Villalobos-Buehner









On February 11, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities (DEH) and Center for Language Studies, ULAB, organized a workshop and seminar with Dr. Richard Smith, Professor of ELT and Applied Linguistics, University of Warwick, UK, and Dr. Maria Villalobos-Buehner, Professor of World Languages, ESL and Bilingual Education, Rider University, USA. The

seminar by Dr. Smith focused on "Teaching in Difficult Circumstances and the Value of Exploratory Pedagogic Inquiry" while Dr. Villalobos-Buehner's workshop delved into

"Exploring the Dynamic Integration of AI as a Support Tool for Inclusive Lesson Planning."



Hosted by Ms. Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head of the Department of English and Humanities, the program had commenced with a welcome address by



Professor Imran Rahman, Vice Chancellor, ULAB. After the address, Ms. Rahman introduced the first speaker, Dr.

Richard Smith.

Dr. Smith began his seminar with insights on overcoming teaching barriers, drawing on historical perspectives of English teaching in Bengal since 1919. He focused on Michael Philip West's observations from teaching in India with reference to West's book *Teaching English in Difficult Circumstances*. Dr. Smith addressed contemporary challenges, such as student fixation on social media and inadequate resources. Solutions included peer correction, engagement strategies, and involving parents, illustrated by success stories from Nepal and Bangladesh. Dr. Smith emphasized the significance of practitioner research, citing examples of different teachers, such as Martha De La Cruz Quintero's techniques for handling misbehavior. The need for action research in specific classroom settings was underscored as it empowers teachers to drive positive changes in the education system.

Following Dr. Smith's seminar, Dr. Faheem Hasan Shahed, Director, CLS, introduced Dr. Maria Villalobos-Buehner who conducted a workshop that explored the SAMR Model

(Substitution, Augmentation, Modification, Redefinition) and focused on the integration of AI, specifically the AI-powered tool Diffit, for inclusive lesson planning. Dr. Maria engaged participants in an interactive activity where participants worked in groups without using their voices. Each three-member team was tasked with creating something out of the white sheets of paper given to each member, which, together, would make a whole. Some teams communicated using sign language and created



interesting interpretations of the project. This task aimed to illustrate the challenges and benefits of inclusive groups. The SAMR model's stages were discussed, emphasizing how Diffit integrates technology by adapting various materials and creating differentiated activities based on language levels and proficiency. Diffit's features, including adapting reading passages, generating quizzes, and creating transcripts, were highlighted. Following the workshop, a discussion ensued on the benefits and challenges of incorporating AI into the curriculum.







The session concluded with closing remarks from Ms. Arifa Rahman. She expressed gratitude to the guest speakers and presented tokens of appreciation. The workshop and seminar provided a comprehensive exploration of effective teaching strategies in challenging circumstances. They also shed light on the integration of AI for inclusive lesson planning, fostering a valuable exchange of insights among the current and future educators.





























On February 12, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities organized the first forum of the 10th DEH Curriculum Integration Program where Mr. Sudeep Chakravarti, Associate Professor and Director, Center for South Asian Studies, was invited as the guest speaker to expound on the theme of the term's

CI program, "Navigating Geopolitical Realities: The Role of Language and Literature." Mr. Chakravarti focused on how language and literature contribute to understanding and maneuvering within geopolitical landscapes.

Hosted by Mr. Golam Kader Zilany, Senior Lecturer, DEH, coordinator of the CI Program this term, the event commenced with a cordial welcome extended to the speaker, faculty members, and attending students. Subsequently, Mr. Zilany delivered a concise overview of the Curriculum Integration's objectives, delineating the term's thematic focus. Additionally, he elucidated the historical and scholarly underpinnings illustrating the role of language and literature in fostering comprehension and navigation within geopolitical contexts.

Mr. Chakravarti commenced an insightful and illuminating discourse by initiating a transfer of significant information from the root question: "What is geopolitics?" He provided the context, historical overview, aspects of geopolitics, and most importantly how it functioned. Mr. Chakravarti also highlighted




the main theme of the CI, the crucial act of language, tone, and literature in geopolitics. The event concluded with a lively question and answer session that were crucial to furthering the understanding of the concept of geopolitics amongst the students.




Event 9: Seven Mandatory DEH Final Term Student Workshops







Every term, DEH organizes seven mandatory workshops to prepare final term students for further studies or the job market. The workshops are conducted by DEH faculty members.



Writing CVs and Cover Letters

On March 7, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities (DEH) at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) organized a workshop titled, "CV and Cover Letter Writing." The workshop was designed for the students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, and ENG 413 to guide them through the objectives and process of writing CVs and Cover Letters. The session was facilitated by Nadia Rahman, Assistant Professor, DEH.

Ms. Rahman initiated the workshop by taking a look at the current CVs of the participating students, while discussing the proper format of categorizing a student's work experience and extracurricular activities in their CV. She suggested that to describe the activities and relevant job responsibilities in the CV, one must use action verbs and be

precise in description. With a sample, she also emphasized the importance of incorporating all the necessary components in the CV, which included updated Address and Contact Information, Academic History, Relevant Skills, Publications, Achievements, and References.

Lastly, Ms. Rahman briefly discussed cover letters, and how they are different from a CV and Resume. She explained that a CV contains an overall record of one's work experience, education history, and skills, while a Resume is prepared keeping the new progress in mind. A cover letter, on the other hand, she stressed, should be tailored according to the job description one would be applying for. Furthermore, she added that the letter should demonstrate how one can contribute to the intended company with a compelling one-page story.

Ms. Rahman, thereafter, provided relevant examples of cover letters and concluded the session with an interactive question and answer session.

Recommendation Letters - Ground Rules

On March 21, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh, hosted a workshop titled, "Recommendation Letters: Ground Rules." This workshop aimed to guide undergraduate students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, ENG 413, and graduate students to understand the significance, components, and strategies for requesting recommendation letters that would be required for jobs and higher studies. The facilitator for the session was Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head and Associate Professor, DEH.

Ms. Rahman began the workshop by explaining the ground rules for requesting a recommendation letter and emphasizing on the necessity of it being professional. She started the session with a brief 5-minute exercise and asked


students to draft an email to a possible referee. She then gathered feedback before starting her presentation. In addition, Ms. Rahman provided a comprehensive explanation of what a recommendation letter is and stated that it is a formal document from anyone who can endorse your work. She also explained the importance of selecting our referees wisely as they will not only highlight the student's achievements but also advocate for their character. Furthermore, she talked about the necessity for the recommendation letter to be customized, rather than being generic. For this, it is essential to provide the referee with as many details as possible. She also emphasized the need for confidentiality in recommendation letters. If not, she clarified, there is a chance of influence, and employers and the admissions committee expect an unbiased, objective overview.

Finally, she discussed tactics like building trusting connections with possible referees, giving them context and relevant information, and making sure requests are made ahead of time, and with clear details and deadlines. Authenticity, specificity, and compliance with the recipient's expectations were emphasized. After that, Ms. Rahman corrected the students' mistakes from the draft emails they had constructed at the beginning of the session by showing a few samples of requests for recommendation letters that were sub-par.

The session was then closed with an interactive question-and-answer period.

Writing Statements of Purpose

On March 14, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh, hosted a workshop titled, "Writing Statements of Purpose". This workshop aimed to guide undergraduate students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, and ENG 413, as well as graduate students, to understand the goals and steps involved in crafting a Statement of Purpose. The facilitator for the session was Dr. Sohana Manzoor, Associate Professor, DEH.

Dr. Manzoor began the workshop by explaining what a statement of purpose is and emphasizing on the necessity of its being compelling. She talked about the importance of it in both professional and academic applications so that it can

effectively convey the applicant's background, goals, and motivations. Moreover, Dr. Manzoor outlined the organizational structure for SoPs which can personalize narratives and illustrate one's qualifications for a specific program. Furthermore, she discussed the role SoPs play in enabling selection committees to determine whether an applicant is suitable for an available position. Here, Dr. Manzoor advised the attending students to summarize their backgrounds, hobbies, and motivations in addition to a brief overview of themselves so that they stand out to the employers or admission committees. She additionally emphasized the significance of incorporating recent extracurricular activities alongside academic achievements. By doing so, applicants can present a holistic portrayal of themselves, further enhancing their opportunity of attaining their desired job or admission.

Finally, Dr. Manzoor advised students to use the pronoun "I" and write the entire statement from the first person perspective. She underscored the importance of relevance, honesty, and clarity. She stressed that writing an SoP is a transformative process that requires introspection, research, and meticulous attention to detail. Additionally, she stated that applicants can greatly improve their chances of success in the competitive environment of admissions by developing a clear narrative and stating their goals. Furthermore, she suggested exploring university websites before drafting their SoP to ensure that it is aligned with the desired institution's objectives.

Thereafter, Dr. Manzoor, provided relevant Statement of Purpose examples and concluded the session with an interactive question and answer session.

Job Hunting and Networking

On March 28, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities (DEH) at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) organized a workshop titled "Job Hunting and Networking." The workshop was designed for the students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, and ENG 413 as well as graduate students to guide them through the process of hunting for jobs and networking. The session was facilitated by Ms. Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head and Associate Professor, Department of English and Humanities.

Ms. Rahman initiated the workshop by asking the students whether they wanted to opt for jobs or higher studies following their graduation. She then explained the complications of the job market and talked about how to be prepared to apply for a job. She asked the students to first

understand their own worth and capabilities. After a self-assessment, it is necessary to identify the company or position they would like to be in in the next ten years as well as the type of industry they would like to work in. She explained the steps for students to prepare for job applications, such as building confidence, updating CVs, and creating a professional profile on sites like LinkedIn, or creating a website to showcase all their achievements that cannot be included in a CV.

Finally, Ms. Rahman stated that one of the important aspects of getting a job is to build a network. Some good ideas to keep in mind are to link with people with similar mindsets or interests, be professional, and also to stay active. She further suggested volunteering as a possible means to build a network and perhaps get a foot in the door of the dream job location. Another positive behavior to build is to keep in touch with past employers and faculty members. Moreover, she mentioned that the students' minor subject taken at university can play a huge role in helping fresh graduates get into the job market. When students are ready to apply for jobs, they must have a customized CV, a similarly customized cover letter, and letters of recommendation as needed. These should be ready to send when asked for. Ms. Rahman, thereafter, provided relevant resources and websites that can help the outgoing students look for jobs in Bangladesh as fresh graduates.

Interview Skills

On April 4, 2024, the Department of English and Humanities (DEH) at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) organized a workshop titled, "Interview Skills." The workshop was designed for the students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, and ENG 413 as well as the MA students to be prepared for any type of interview, either for jobs or higher studies. The workshop was facilitated by Ms. Nadia Rahman, Assistant Professor, Department of English and Humanities.

Ms. Rahman started the session by giving a few important pointers about the interview scenario. She mentioned that interviewees should introduce themselves in such a way that the interviewer can ask them further questions. By doing this, communication is built and the interviewer will also be interested in the works of the interviewee.

Ms. Rahman then moved on to a short question/answer session where she asked the students what they wanted to do in their future, with the majority of students choosing work or higher studies. According to Ms. Rahman, one of the important aspects of anyone wanting to go for an interview is that they should first realize what kind of interview they are appearing for.

The next major part focused on preparing for the interview. Ms. Rahman mentioned that interviewees must always understand their job description, where they are applying, and the philosophy of the institution. By analyzing these aspects, interviewees can create the answers according to the position or organization they are applying to. Furthermore, interviewees must also decide on their strengths, skill areas, and experiences, and with it, compile relevant documents for the interview.

The next part that Ms. Rahman talked about is interviews in the case of cultural exchange programs. A student going to attend one of these programs should be familiar with the history and culture of the other country as well as their own, be willing to participate in the programs they will attend, and be comfortable with the campus life of a different institution. Also, in the case of financial aid, interviewees must portray that they are willing to work in return for the benefits they will receive.

Ms. Rahman then moved on to the next part where she mentioned that it is important to be punctual for an interview. Interviewees must also show confidence through their body language and must speak at a slower pace so that the interviewer understands them. She also gave a very important reminder about connecting the interviewees' past experiences with the current job application to generate an interesting aspect to the conversation. She, however, discouraged students from talking for more than one to two minutes per question.

Lastly, she pointed out how to deal with unfamiliar questions. The correct way to do this is to analyze the questions, break them down into simpler parts, and answer them one by one while also justifying any answer being given.

Ms. Rahman, ended the session with important tips, such as being proficient in Bangla and English so that the interviewee can answer in any language, and being confident and mindful of body language. She also mentioned what to do in case of video interviews; to understand the company policy on video interviews; and to do everything accordingly.

Presentation Skills

The Department of English and Humanities (DEH) at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) held a session called "Presentation Skills" on April 18, 2024. The workshop was developed for students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499 and ENG 413, as well as students of MA, to enhance their presentation capabilities. The session was led by Ms. Nadia Rahman, Assistant Professor, Department of English and Humanities.

Ms. Rahman started the session with a question to the students about what they should do during a presentation. Upon hearing the responses, she went on to explain the do's and don'ts of presentations, and emphasized on summarizing the contents as well as

focusing on the relevant topics. She further talked about the importance of time management, as well as avoiding stage fright, as it is something that many students suffer from. Additionally, she told the students to be mindful of the audience as they can become distracted.

Ms. Rahman mentioned the four P's: plan, prepare, practice, and perform, stating that students will be much better at presenting in front of an audience using these four P's. She also mentioned that there are three messages that every presenter must be mindful about: the physical message, which the presenter conveys through their posture and appearance; the visual message, which is conveyed by the contents of their PowerPoint slides through the use of muted colors and standard fonts because experimenting can often result in the audience not being able to read or understand the slides; and the story message, where the presenter must connect their points with the topic selected to keep it coherent.

Ms. Rahman ended the session by telling the students that they, in turn, must be a good audience member by showing respect to the other presenters and being mindful of the presenters' words. Ms. Rahman wrapped up the session by showing the students some samples about how to prepare their PowerPoint slides as a presenter.

The Department of English and Humanities (DEH) at the University of Liberal Arts Bangladesh (ULAB) held a session called "So, What's Next" on April 25, 2024. The workshop was developed for students enrolled in ENG 498, ENG 499, and ENG 413 to walk them through the goals and procedures of higher education and career opportunities. Applying abroad necessitates the preparation of several documents, including background research, a list of desired universities, transcripts, certificates, recommendation letters, funds, proficiency tests, updated CVs, SOPs, and other essays, passports, and visa applications, which can take up to a year. She recommended that anyone interested in applying to graduate schools abroad begin the process as soon as possible to secure enrollment in the 2025 session and by this time arrange the necessary elements.





Ms. Arifa Ghani Rahman, Head of the Department of English and Humanities, conducted the workshop with the aim of guiding the SP students to improve their writing skills for research.

During the presentation, the facilitator shared her unique perspectives on the significance of research and studies in

the field of English language and literature. In addition to that, she discussed the opportunities available to the students who are participating in the Scholars Program and the ways in which they can benefit from it.


In addition, Ms. Rahman detailed the most typical errors that occur in research and offered advice on how to avoid making them. In addition, she discussed the significance of language, including the need to avoid redundancy and write in a concise manner, both of which can have an effect on the readers. She provided examples of the various ways in which academic writers overlook specific issues including mixing of spellings, inconsistencies in punctuation and capitalization, using blanket statements, and mixing formatting styles.

The program was co-hosted by Tasfiyah Saba (MA Batch 241) and Fatema Aftab Miah (Batch 211).












































































